ANNOUNCEMENTS

PASSES NEEDED FOR EVERY SINGLE SKIER:

All children & youth need either a season pass or a day pass for insurance purposes; it's that piece of plastic or paper that provides your child with insurance. For some reason, parents have been skipping this when filling out registration on Zone4. **Children (but not youth) ski for free but still need to have a pass.** Please go back into Zone 4 & register your children.

On the topic of passes- Jan wants to remind everyone that there is no cell service at the Nordic Centre, so all transactions must be made by cash in the envelopes or E-transfers: treasurer@bvnordic.ca. You can also purchase a day pass at McBike & Sport on Main Street before heading up.



FROM JAN (GM) & KEVIN (DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS):

1. LOGGING UPDATE ☺:

Hauling operations on both Upper Logging Road & Broadway are finished! Once we have more snow, we'll groom Upper Logging Road & the sections of Broadway and Demo Forest. In the meantime, we have filled the gap between Broadway and Wetzinkwa with snow, as well as Demo Forest Rd and Valley View, so skiers no longer need to walk across the logging access. Thank you, Wetzin'kwa Community Forest, for collaborating to limit disruptions to skiing. Management & contractors took extra measures to finish the project quickly, ensure signage for safety, and graded the roads while keeping them free of debris.

Skiers may notice small cut blocks on Valleyview and Upper Logging Road. These patch cuts were carried out to demonstrate different harvesting techniques. Specifically, the community forest partnered with a biologist to harvest trees in a way that also supports goshawk populations. The smaller patches are located within goshawk hunting areas, giving the birds improved access to prey species. Additionally, this approach maintains shade along the Upper Logging Road, which benefits skiing conditions.

2. GROOMER STRUGGLES:

Parents, we're glad the kids enjoy the club's toys & sleds. However, when they're left out on the snow they create major issues for our groomers. Hidden toys get pulled into the groomer & break apart, leaving pieces scattered & causing significant delays to clean up. Stopping the groomer also leaves ridges that affect skiing. To avoid this, **please return toys & sleds to the deck before you leave**. The toy issue is disruptive enough that we may need to remove the toys altogether—which we'd really like to avoid.

3. Another friendly reminder that there are a lot of moving parts around the Nordic Centre, and we ask for everyone to slow down driving in & out of the Nordic Centre. Kids, dogs, cars & adults are all part of the fun but please pay attention when behind the wheel. The trails are not going anywhere.
4. Note about grooming, we don't groom during warm fronts, wet snow, rain or other strange weather events, as this makes for potential rock-hard snow when frozen, that will be a challenge to groom if there's no new snow for a week or so. We believe in patience & we know that the results will be better.

An honorarium is paid for instructing time and for one hour of course requirements.


Sessions: Tuesdays/Wednesdays 10:00-11:30/12:30-2:00 and Thursdays 10:00-11:30





HOLIDAY STORY WALK:




MCBIKE WELCOME DAY:

DOG POOP, DOG ETIQUETTE:


1. Let's be honest, the dogs are getting a bum rap (literally), it's all of us owners, that need to up our game. The dog trails are a tremendous success, seeing more use than any other part of our network, but with this gift comes a responsibility, and it's more so every year. Please, be calm when encounters arise, and polite & open to a version of events that might not be easy to hear. We know altercations happen but in general people are more upset with the reaction they get from the owner than with the actual dog incident itself.

CCBC NORTH ZONE ON SNOW CAMP:

The Teck Regional Snow Camp (Northern Region) brought together 90 athletes and 24 coaches from clubs across the Northern Region, including Snow Valley (Terrace), Bulkley Valley (Smithers), Omineca (Burns Lake), Nechako (Vanderhoof), Caledonia (Prince George), Mackenzie Nordiques (Mackenzie) and 100 Mile Nordics (100 Mile).

Blessed by the 'Nordic snow gods', skiers enjoyed three fantastic days of skiing, many athletes getting on snow for the first time this season. Skiers also enjoyed incredible meals and snacks over the course of the weekend provided by a crew of wonderful cooks and helpers.
